

Gender and Global Child Health

a short introduction by Nemanja Novkovic

It is impossible to imagine the global social discourses of recent years and decades without the topic of gender. Countless institutes deal with gender issues and every major university has chairs on gender studies that explore the topic in its cultural, social and individual manifestations.

The differences between the sexes have diverse effects of a socio-cultural, ethical, moral and traditional nature in a global context. These inherited cultural differences overwhelmingly discriminate women; this is already evident in the fact that it is only in isolated cases and only in very small groups that we can speak of matriarchal societies at all. However, the discrimination begins long before women become women: in many parts of the world, girls are already disadvantaged at birth compared to boys, which can later lead to psychological, psychiatric, physical symptoms and illnesses. But boys and men also face problems that can be described as gender-specific: They are much more frequently addicted to gambling or substances and the suicide rate among men is much higher than among women. Whether boy, girl or completely outside the binary gender spectrum: The challenges that children and young adults face throughout their lives are of essential relevance. This applies both culturally and sociologically as well as medically.

The congress, to which we would like to invite you, deals with these differences and challenges of the sexes in its manifold manifestations and would like to contribute to the current discourse. Particular attention will be paid to the health of children in a global context.

The UFA Fabrik

The UFA Fabrik is a former film production site which has been reopened in 1976 as a cultural center combining eco-friendly living and nutrition with sociocultural events throughout the year.

Approximately 30 residents and over 180 employees come together to live, work, and share their cultural, creative, and social lifestyle with one another. 

The award acknowledges colleagues with their special commitment, scientific research and projects related to tropical paediatrics and global child health who are willing to present their work at an annual conference.

The abstracts of the presentation or poster are to be submitted to the conference organiser. Invited speakers are excluded from the contest. There is no age limit.

The winning contribution will be selected during the conference by a jury consisting of three scientists or clinicians with experience in global child health from the GTP. The award amounts to 500 Euros and can be granted to a maximum of two outstanding presentations or posters from aspiring scientists or clinicians.
